RYST NEWSLETTER SPRING 2021





As you know I write to you each year in December thanking you for your support and letting you know what your contribution has achieved. But there's so much exciting stuff happening this year, that...well...I can't possibly wait until Christmas to tell you about it! So welcome to your Spring Newsletter.

First, the Schools Programme. This is now up and running again in the majority of our 19 schools and it's a joy to see the children outdoors and back on the water after the long months of lockdown. Studies have shown that children — especially those from disadvantaged families - have been disproportionately affected by the pandemic, so getting physically and socially active again is important for their health and well-being.

Second, the Tall Ships. You'll be aware they're coming to Falmouth in August for the start of the 2021 Magellan-Elcano 500 Series race to Cadiz. The Trust has arranged for 10 young people, 16 to 18, to take part aboard TS *Maybe* in the first leg, a 10-day race to A Coruna.

This will be an exciting trip on an historic 24-metre two-masted gaff ketch. *Maybe* took part in the first ever International Tall Ships Race in 1956. 65 years later, she's one of the few original boats still competing in them.

An exciting trip for the voyagers – and for us. This is the first step towards our goal of supporting young people aged 16-plus who've 'graduated' from our Schools Programme, helping them get the experience and life skills needed for quality jobs in maritime and other industries.

The project would not be possible without the support of our corporate and charity sponsors, who are paying for berths, return travel and insurance, so the trip is completely free for our lucky voyagers.

A big thank you to CAD Architects, H Tiddy Estate Agents, Dr Andrew Langdale, St Just in Roseland Parish Council, St Mawes Pier & Harbour Company and St Mawes Sailing Club, who have each sponsored a place for one of the voyagers.

And thank you twice over to St Austell-based accountants **Phillips Frith** and to **Superyacht Charities**, who have each sponsored places for two voyagers.

We're also grateful to **Classic Sailing** who have waived their arrangement fee in booking places on *Maybe*.

You'll find a comment from the sponsors at the end of this newsletter. Meanwhile, we're in the process of shortlisting and interviewing applicants and you'll be able to follow their progress on www.ryst.org.uk and on our social channels – more about that in a moment.

Third, the Clay Country project. Last year we responded to the challenge of the pandemic by arranging 1:1 tuition for the first 100 children in our Schools Programme to apply. This was such a success that we're repeating the approach this year, albeit in small groups of four rather than 1:1, targeting schools specifically in economically deprived communities in the Clay Country. We have 60 children aged 9-15 signed up to achieving RYA Stages 1, 2 or 3 (depending on current ability) through the summer. We're grateful to **Cornwall Community Foundation** for part-funding the project, which aims to create a measurable improvement in children's self-esteem and confidence through the experience of working towards the RYA qualifications. And a big thank you to private donors like you for funding the balance.

Fourth, G7 – and Cornwall will be in the global media spotlight as the leaders of the G7 countries meet at Carbis Bay next month. With climate change a key focus of the summit, we're taking all 100 children at Foxhole Learning Academy to Polkerris Beach the week before to develop their enjoyment, respect and knowledge of the marine environment.

There will be a mix of water-based activities (sailing, kayaking, paddle-boarding), land-based activities (beach-cleaning and artworks using ocean plastic waste) and lessons about marine conservation.

Hopefully it will be a memorable experience for the children and a friendly and inspiring welcome to G7 delegates arriving in Cornwall in the same week.

Foxhole Learning Academy will further benefit from an award by one of our charity sponsors. As well as funding two places on *Maybe* for the Tall Ships race, **Superyacht Charities** has also donated funds for 20 Foxhole Academy children to learn to sail this year, for which we and the school are extremely grateful.

Fifth – the **Tresanton Classics**. Having been forced to cancel in 2020 due to the Covid crisis, the Rustler 24/Piper Association has confirmed that the inaugural Tresanton Classics event will go ahead this year on Sunday 6 June at St Mawes. Lady Torpy has kindly said that any profits from the day will go to RYST. You can find entry details at https://www.rustler24piper.com/tresanton-classics

You will have noticed that we are doing more in the way of fund-raising from both charity sponsors and corporate sponsors so we can build on your generous support as a private donor to achieve even more.

We anticipate that most charity and corporate funding will be dedicated to specific projects, such as the Tall Ships and Clay Country projects; also to support for specific schools nominated by the donor. This year, for example, **Classic Cottages** are kindly funding lessons for children at St Mawes School and **Rodda's** for children at Restormel Academy.

Your private donations will continue to support the Schools Programme, which is our core activity as a Trust. So thank you for continuing to make a difference to the lives of children in Cornwall. We remain committed to our promise that 100% of private donations goes to getting children on the water: trustees and volunteers give their time free and pay admin costs out of their own pockets.
