"Our son, TOMMY was three months old when he was found to have Bilateral Coloboma as part of a rare genetic condition he has. It is still early days and we don't yet know the extent to which his vision will be affected. At the moment, not knowing is the hardest part for us but we are happy to have found MACS to help us through this journey."

Activity Trips

Calvert (ages 5 - 18)

This year's activity trips took place at the Calvert Trust Centre in the Lake District. The centre is situated in a stunning location overlooking Bassenwaite lake.

We soon reached booking capacity and were delighted to see that a large proportion of children were new; having never engaged with MACS before. They were also children with severe complex needs. Where they may previously have felt this trip was not accessible to them due to their additional needs (many requiring 24hour one-to-one support), MACS staff have worked hard to bust this myth and are delighted to see such a positive response.

In total, 60% of children attending had additional and complex needs. Each child had the chance to participate in a sporting activity, alongside their peers - something they never thought possible, but this did mean that we needed to fund additional specialist care support staff.

Grant funding contributed 40% of the overall costs for week. This is lower than expected due to the increased costs and being unfortunate in securing a regular grant which would have meant 88% of the overall costs would have been covered.



"When your child has complex needs it is difficult to find any charity willing to include them on these types of trips. The care team were great with Josselin."

Giving Families a Break

25 holiday vouchers issued this year



Giving Families A Break is a holiday voucher scheme that provides much needed respite, with physical and mental health benefits, for MACS families across the UK.


Almost half of people in poverty in the UK are in a household with a disabled person/are disabled themselves so this service really does help make the impossible, possible. Each family receives £750 to be redeemed with our holiday partner who provide flexibility and choice for families enabling them to pursue the most accessible option for their circumstances.

Staying Connected

Our online support groups have grown 10% over the last year, now supporting over 812 people.

"Having a Facebook group with other families that we could ask questions was amazing and everyone is so supportive and helps in any way they can."

Away from the screen we were delighted to resume our MACS MeetUps. Our first event this year was held at Warrington Woolston Play and Sensory Centre. The majority of attendees were first timers at a MACS event. One family even made a round trip of over 320miles to meet other MACS members.







On a more local level, we are so pleased to update you that we now have 24 Local Social Group (LSG) volunteers, taking the lead on organising activities for members in their local area. We've been delighted to see such a positive response from funders to progress these in their areas, including Sovereign Healthcare who donated a wonderful £4000 to help set-up two LSGs in Bradford.

The yellow dots on our members map shows where LSG volunteers are located. Our aim moving forward is to have at least one LSG in every county across the UK.

One seasonal get-together that always goes down well is the **pantomime**. MACS is organising a number of accessible trips this year for members to enjoy and is thrilled to receive £3000 funding from the National Lottery Awards for All (Wales) to fund our very first panto in Cardiff, which will fund 50 members for 2 shows.



The special pantomimes offer audio description and sign language enabling MACS children to enjoy the same opportunities as everyone else.

Your local, national charity

Local and Regional Funding

MACS is a national charity, yes! But we do operate at a local level and are able to ringfence your donation to a specific area if required. At this point, we'd like to thank the funders who have given so generously over the year to progress services in their local area.

The Eveson Trust for example has provided much needed funds to support members in the West Midlands (specifically Herefordshire, Worcestershire, Sutton Coldfield, Wolverhampton, Walsall, Sandwell, Dudley). We've also received funding specifically for South Yorkshire, Nottinghamshire, Derbyshire, East Lancashire and Cheshire.

The Big Give

As part of our fundraising strategy to diversify income streams, MACS is taking part in The Big Give Christmas Challenge, and this year, we have approached Trusts and Foundations for the first time to support this initiative.

We are very grateful to the funders who responded so positively to this request keeping us on target to raise £9800 through this matched funding campaign.

All funds generated through this campaign will be directed towards supporting our members through our regional MeetUp events which connect local families for peer support.

Core - blime

As a remote working charity with 5.8FTE staff, overheads are kept to a minimum. However, they remain essential to the continued operation of the charity. Any core funding we receive to help cover these costs is hugely beneficial and gives us the flexibility to apply other funding towards the current greatest need/s.


Based on our latest audited accounts (year end December 2021), 70p of every £1 donated is spent on charitable activities and service delivery.

Meetups for MACS Children

Helping Hand

Helping Hand supports members in the most meaningful way possible. Members can apply for funding based on their own needs and Helping Hand subsidises the cost – be it specialist aids/equipment, life changing experiences, or medical needs. Whatever the reason, this initiative helps meet the extra costs associated with living with a disability, supporting people like Cassidy who received a Helping Hand this year.....

Cassidy is studying a BTec photography course. She has a natural talent and even with her visual impairment, is excelling and winning awards. Recognising this, her college invited her to take part in a photography trip to Iceland but. A £1000 Helping Hand grant from MACS enabled Cassidy to participate in this trip which was otherwise unaffordable.

This extraordinary, life-changing opportunity helped develop Cassidy's skills so she can go on to thrive in a profession that she is so passionate about, whilst simultaneously boosting her self-esteem and the feeling of fulfilment. As she says herself, it will "develop my photography further than 12-year-old me would have ever imaged when I took my first landscape photograph."

With grateful thanks to the Hospital Saturday Fund, we can start 2023 with restricted funds specifically to give other MACS members a Helping Hand in 2023.

Making Waves

Our sailing adventure this year reached capacity with 15 MACS members aged 16 - 25 embarking on board the *Prolific* (managed by the Ocean Youth Trust) and sailing 151 nautical miles over the course of seven days. The group consisted of ten MACS young people and five carers, two of whom are sibling carers.

I first sailed because of MACS in 2013 when I was 13 years old and since then I've been all over Scotland and southern England sailing- I'm now 22 years old, 8 trips down and a volunteer for OYT

If it wasn't for MACS I would not have been able to experience this journey and perusing this beyond the yearly MACS trips. I urge any young macs people interested in sailing to give it a try on the MACS voyage next year.

I'm so greatful for the opportunities macs has provided me and I can't wait for more sailing adventures next season $\underline{\mathbb{A}}$



We use the outcomes wheel, developed by Children in Need and the Prince's Trust to measure how crew members felt about themselves at the start of the voyage and again at the end, giving themselves marks out of six in ten different areas.

We saw a marked change from the start to the end results, with overall scores for all the young people moving up 53 points from the start to the end of the voyage. These were evaluated in the following categories:

- 1. Feeling confident (+13 points overall)
- 2. Working in a team (+17 points overall)
- 3. Learning new skills (+10 points overall)
- 4. Coping with new experiences (+13 points overall)

More than that though, this trip provides opportunities for life as illustrated by Victoria (left).





Focus on the future

2023 is shaping up to be an exciting year with some new ventures in mind. The whole team and board are meeting on 24 January 2023 for a Strategic Development, Theory of Change, Impact and Evaluation Workshop. At this point, a member-wide survey will have been completed to better inform service design in line with member needs.

Our previous member-wide survey led to our 2018 Confident and Connected document, which mapped out our ambitions for the next four-years. Sadly, the impact of Covid and lockdowns meant a lot of this work had to be put on hold and needs reviewing. At this stage our key priorities remain to

- Diversifying and developing sustainable income streams
- Increasing awareness of the charity and expanding our reach to more people with MACS conditions.
- Developing our service offering to address need and reach more members.

We intend to maintain our member-led ethos throughout the year by organising more local/regional MACS MeetUps and will be inviting members to take part in a focus group at each meeting to better understand their changing needs. This will help us adapt our service programme for members as they grown up and their needs change.

This really is an exciting time to be part of the MACS family. We could not have reached this point without the outstanding support from the Trusts and Foundations community and thank each and every one of you for being the difference to families across the UK affected by these rare and irreversible conditions.
