Trinity House

In October, a special group of students were given the opportunity to visit Trinity House and take a tour. Trinity House has a unique history, dating back to the reign of Henry VIII.

“Trinity House is a charity dedicated to safeguarding shipping and seafarers, providing education, support and welfare to the seafaring community with a statutory duty as a General Lighthouse Authority to deliver a reliable, efficient and cost-effective aids to navigation service for the benefit and safety of all mariners. The Corporation of Trinity House was incorporated by Royal Charter in 1514 to regulate pilotage on the River Thames and provide for aged mariners.” (TrinityHouse.co.uk, 2024)

The Students had a great time, learning about the history of Trinity House, its importance today and long support and association with London Nautical School, for which we are very grateful.



HMS Carrier Ship The Queen Elizabeth

In September LNS students received a very special invitation to board the Royal Navy Carrier Ship HMS Queen Elizabeth II.

This was a fantastic trip, giving our students an insight into how the Royal Navy crew live, serve and work together on board the ship.

"HMS Queen Elizabeth is one of the largest and most powerful vessels ever constructed for the Royal Navy. This awe-inspiring warship can accommodate up to 40 aircraft. As well as state-of-the-art weaponry and communications systems, HMS Queen Elizabeth boasts five gyms, a chapel and a medical centre.

The flight deck of HMS Queen Elizabeth comes in at an enormous four acres and is used to launch the fearsome new F35 Joint Strike Fighter fast jet. Four fighter jets can be moved from the hangar to the flight deck in just one minute. The ship's two propellers weigh 33 tonnes each. The powerplant behind them generates enough power to run 1,000 family cars". (royalnavy.mod.uk 2025)

As well as receiving a tour, students got to experience an array of different activities from holding weapons, using climbing walls and seeing how the crew medics tend to the servicemen and women.



London Youth Summit

On Wednesday 4th of December 2024 two of our Mental Health Ambassadors from the school and the Vice Chair of the Equality Council attended the London Youth Summit run by the Metropolitan police force. This event was aimed at empowering young people to find their voices surrounding the issue of misogyny.

The event saw 300 young people come together from schools across London. The summit was a unique opportunity for students to engage in dialogue around misogyny. The Summit contributed to their awareness of signs of abusive relationships, increased their trust in reporting and helped to improve young people's confidence to safely call out misogynistic behaviour; this in turn reduces misogynistic behaviours.

Increasing young people's safety and confidence in this area supports them in how to report inappropriate content and reduce the risk of them joining toxic support networks.

The boys had a really thought provoking and interesting time at the summit, and they have come away with plenty of ideas to integrate into school life.

Debating Competition

On Thursday 14th of November 2024, Archie Patel, Zachary Simpson, Nikita Krekels, Aiden Shepherd, Mouhamad Ba Diop, Kays Khoudour and Daniel Hannam Valles visited St Joseph's school in Upper Norwood with Ms Jewitt to participate in the London Boys' School Network debating competition.

Our school debated on whether AI is affecting schools positively or negatively. We were not informed in advance which side we would take so had to be prepared for both. On the day we were given the position of "proposer" so had to argue that AI has a positive impact. We focused on how it can help teachers and provide effective homework.

Schools were judged by a panel on their performance, presentation and their knowledge. Even though we did not progress any further in the competition as we were up against an established debate team from William Ellis School who have been meeting every week for years, our team gave an excellent performance in our first ever debate and Nikita won a medal for his contributions. Rutlish School won the competition overall and now Nikita has been inspired to start a debate club at school.

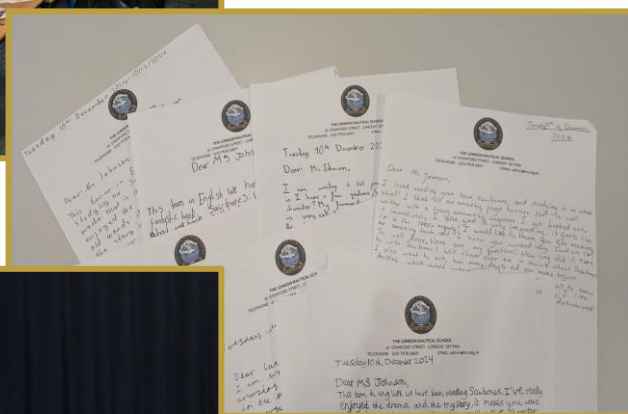

English Author Visit and Trip to the Old Operating Theatre

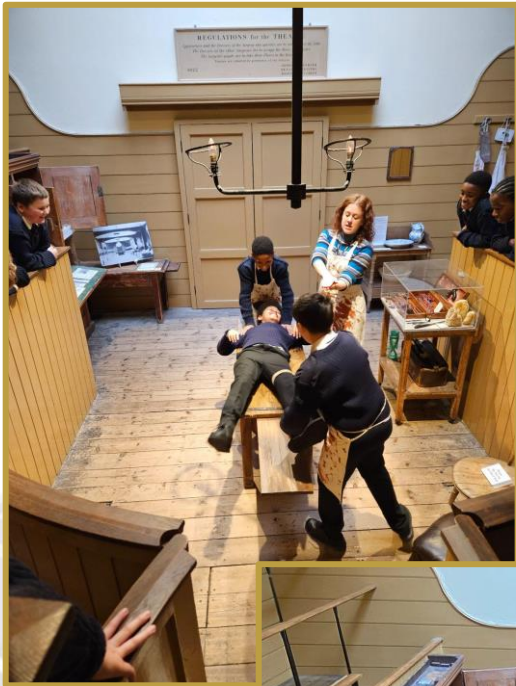

This December the Year 7 students got to go to a theatre of a different kind, they went on a trip to the Old Operating Theatre as part of their English studies. Pupils have been reading *Sawbones* by Catherine Johnson this term; a novel about a young surgeon's apprentice in Victorian London who goes on a wild adventure full of gravediggers, anatomists, stolen rubies and more. The Old Operating Theatre features in the novel, so the boys got to see a real location from the story! They watched a lecture on amputations and operations, and explored a museum full of pickled body parts, real skeletons and letters written by prominent surgeons hundreds of years ago. They have had a brilliant time learning about all things gory and gruesome.

STEM Trip to Williams F1 Test Centre

As a teacher, you are always looking for extra curricular trips that will really add value to the students educational experience. Often, trips linked to careers, can provide this, along with raising aspirations for our students, that are both interactive and interesting.

I don't say this light heartedly, the trip to Williams F1 Test Centre is up there with one on the best we have ever run; for a 6am start at LNS, it had to be!

The trip was focused on targeting students interested in careers within Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics. Formula 1 teams have an abundance of careers available in this field. The day had three parts.

Part 1 was a STEM workshop. Students had to work in teams to create the nose of an F1 Car. The objective was to design an object out of a carpet of materials to essentially, reduce the force of impact in a crash. Students had a budget that they had to work within, they had to test their product and make improvements before presenting their final design. There were some fantastic designs. The winning team were given a Williams water bottle as a prize.



Part 2 and 3 were on a rotation. Students were split into two groups. One session was a tour of the Team Williams museum which has the second largest collection of F1 cars, from Nigel Mansell's championship winning car to Ayrton Senna's and Damon Hill's car. Students learnt about the dynamic design of the cars and got to hold a steering wheel and sit in the driver's seat.

Whilst the tour was going on for one group, the others got to play on the F1 simulators. Students got to race, virtually, around Silverstone, Texas, Australia and Monaco. We were joined by F3 Williams Driver Luke Browning and Oleksander Bondarev. However, it was Year 9 student Joshua Pickersgill who claimed the biggest victory, he beat both round the Monaco track, in the rain and with damage controls off!

Football

Selected students have also been lucky enough to participate in a fitness testing day at Under Armour with many of the students receiving free training kit as a result of their performances.

But perhaps the best story of the year has been the success of the FA Youth Cup team, representing Merstham Town. The students involved are currently in the 4th round proper of the FA Youth Cup to play against Chelsea under 18s having beaten Burgess Hill in the 3rd round last night (18/12/24)

Three of our other teams are sitting at the top of their respective leagues which only goes to show the strength and depth that we have throughout the academy, and we are looking to build on those positions in the new year.
